The Brundtland Commission's definition of the term -"meeting the needs of the present generation without comprising the needs of future generations".



#### SUSTAINABLE MANAGEMENT OF TROPICAL FORESTS

Sustainable forest management is the process of managing permanent forest land to achieve one or more clearly specified objectives of management with regard to the production of a continuous flow of desired forest products and services without undue reduction of its inherent values and future productivity and without undue undesirable effects on the physical and social environment. ### TO OUR MEMBERS

#### THE WOOD-BASED INDUSTRIES IN REVIEW

The unsettled issue on whether the government should adopt a policy of a selective or a total ban on commercial logging, which has long been being debated in Congress, has continued to cause serious instability of the woodbased industries.

Near the end of the six-year administration of President Corazon C. Aquino and close to the coming synchronized national elections in mid-1992, the issue has become more political than socio-economic and environmental in nature. The House of Representative of Congress, in HB No. 21223, had adopted for a selective logging ban while the Senate, in SB 1404, for a total commercial logging ban each respective position understandable with respect to the type of voting constituency it wanted to have an appeal to.

In the meantime, compounding this singular issue was the promulgation of a series of policies and regulations more severe than those in the preceding years - by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR).

With this muddled albeit negative policy environment operating during the year under review, the very poor performance of the wood-based industries was anticipated and expected - as the comparative statistical data reveal.

The number of existing timber license agreements (TLAs) was reduced by 23% (from 75 in 1990 down to 58 by the end of 1991); the annual allowable cut by 51% (from 4.73 million cu m in 1990 down to 2.33 million cu m in 1991); and the forest concession areas under TLAs by 19% (from 2.81 million ha in 1990 down to 2.27 million ha in 1991).

The impact of reduced areas of operation and annual allowable cut on the supply of logs and the production of primary wood products may be appreciated in the following discussion.

#### Roundwood or Log Supply

The local wood production diminished by 35% (from 2.50 million cum in 1990 down to 1.63 million cum in 1991). To augment the legal source of log supply, some primary wood processors imported some 0.40 million cum of logs primarily from the States of Sabah and Sarawak in Malaysia, a 5% importation increase from the preceding year of 0.38 million cum. Other wood processors had also sourced from industrial forest plantations, as in the past, in order to further augment supply of roundwood for primary wood processing.

Despite the reduction of log availability, the pressure of demand for logs was less keenly felt because of the general economic downtrend in the country during the period. The conceivable shortage of log supply needed by the informal wood processing sector could have had been met through non-legitimate supply.

#### Production of Wood Products

With the exception of veneer which increased by 10% from 1990 level, the production of other primary wood products such as lumber and plywood was characterized by downtrends.

Plywood production was down by 23% (from 0.40 million cum in 1990 to 0.31 million cum in 1991) while lumber was down by 16% (from 0.84 million cum in 1990 to 0.71 million cum in 1991).

As an aggregate, the total volume production of primary wood products diminished by 0.22 million cum, or 17% (from 1.29 million cum to 1.07 million cum).

#### Markets

Of the 1.07 million cum of aggregately produced primary wood products in 1991, 0.21 million cum, or nearly 20%, went to the export market as against the aggregate production of 1.29 million cum with 0.31 million cum, or 24%, going to the export market in 1990.

On the aggregate, there had been a 32% reduction in volume of primary wood export between 1990 and 1991; although there was an 8% average increase in unit prices of these products.

On an individual commodity basis, the 1990 and 1991 comparative export performance: logs (falcata) went down by 96% by volume (from 51,000 cum to a mere 2,000 cum) and 95% by value (from US\$2.86 million to US\$ 0.14 million); lumber down by 25% by volume (from 77,000 cum to 58,000 cum) and 14% by value (from US\$ 19.42 million to US\$ 16.64 million); plywood down by 36% by volume (from 176,000 cum to 112,000 cum) and 31% by value (from US\$60.23 million to US\$41.76 million); veneer down by 30% by volume (from 47,000 cum to 33,000 cum) and 28% by value (from US\$13.08 million to US\$9.46 million); and other wood panels down by 29% by volume (from 7,000 cum to 5,000 cum) and 24% by value (from US\$2.13 million to US\$1.63 million). The usual traditional markets absorbed the export of these commodities.

The manufactured articles showed the only slight in-

crease of 7% in terms of export value (from US\$118.55 million in 1990 to US\$127.07 million in 1991. It maybe noted, however, that this group of wood manufactured articles has become dominant among wood export commodities, accounting for 55% of total export of wood products of US\$216.27 million, surpassing the combined primary wood products export of just US\$97.72 million in 1990. In 1991 this group accounted for 65% of all wood products export which totalled US\$196.69 million, again surpassing the combined primary wood products export of just US\$69.62 million. The export trend indeed is toward highly-finished, high added value wood products. Obvious, however, is the high dependence of this downstream manufacturing sector on the primary wood-based industries that supply the raw materials of the former.

The balance between the locally manufactured and minimally imported primary wood products and those that went to export, needless to say, was absorbed by the domestic market - segmented into the end-user construction and housing industries and the export-oriented downstream wood-based industries.

Viewed against log and primary wood products impor-

tation which, in 1991, amounted to 408,000 cum in volume (97% in logs) and US\$25.58 million in value (91% due logs), a positive net trade balance of US\$44.04 million was achieved by the country as against US\$59.00 million in 1990 - both, nonetheless, mere shadows of US\$170.00 million positive net trade balance in the commodities achieved in 1989.

#### Major Issues Faced

The 1990 and 1991 local production, export, and trade balnce performances simply reflected the grave difficulties the primary wood-based industries had undergone, and continue to undergo, through severe government policy indecisions and constraints, undoubtedly being strongly influenced by the environmentalists. Elsewhere in this Report is a summary of the major issues that confronted the wood-based industries during the period under review.

Unless the next administration intervenes positively, the wood-based industries as a whole can hardly expect for even a mild turn around and perhaps, to proceed to a form of stability for an extended life cycle.





Its forest nursery and greening project in Metro Manila merited for PWPA a Golden World Award for Excellence from the International Public Relations Association.

#### THE ASSOCIATION

Your Association - through its Board of Directors and Officers - continued to exert its utmost best to protect the interest of its members and the wood-based industries as a whole, including the downstream wood processing and the consumer sectors. It lobbied in Congress against a total commercial logging ban. It convinced Congress for a fair forest tax as it argued before the Court against the environmental fee imposed by the DENR.

Your Association intensified its public information campaign as it participated in various urban reforestation and metro greening projects deemed at expressing concern for a more habitables urban areas and at the same time projecting the true image of the wood-based industries. Parenthetically, your Association's efforts at urban greening activities merited the recognition of no less than the prestigious International Public Relations Association, the reputable aggrupation of PR professionals around the world.

Your Association continued to be active in international and regional forestry, wood industry and trade fora. Representing PWPA in meetings of the Asean Panel Producers Federation (APPF) during the year were Directors Ernesto F. Sanvictores and Edith I. Alcantara and Executive Director L. D. Angeles who continued to be the Chairman of APPF Council, the Philippine Head of Del-

egation, and the Secretary-General of APPF, respectively. Representing PWPA in the meetings of Asia-Pacific Tropical Timber Organization (ATTO) during the year were PWPA Chairman of the Board of Directors Antonio G. Bernas and PWPA President Antonio C. Olizon, Director Sanvictores continued to serve as Chairman of the Council of the International Tropical Timber Organization (ITTO) and during his term three separate significant international meetings, in Japan, Chile and Indonesia, were convened to elayate the concern of tropical countries in sustainable management of their forest resources.

The perspectives and views of the wood-based industries on the concept of sustainable development of natural resources were invariably elaborated on, through the presentation of policy papers in various regional and local fora, by Directors Bernas, Olizon and Sanvictores.

Finally, through this Report, your Board of Directors and Officers would like to express their profound gratitude to all the members of the Association who, without exception, stood by them during the many periods of anxieties, agonies and difficulties and who, as one, sustained them with the much-needed moral courage and tangible support in order that the wood-based industries may persevere.

### 1991 MAJOR INDUSTRY **ISSUES**



The Issues

Position Taken By PWPA

Status

- A. Arising from Administration Orders of DENR
- 1. Mandatory reforestation deposit, per DAO No. 01, s. 1991
  - 1.1 Immediate suspension and/or cancellation of TLA due to deficiency in reforestation accomplishment incurred within the year.
  - 1.2 Posting by the TLA of a 3-year surety bond for faithful compliance of reforestation.
- 2. Shifting logging from virgin to residual forest, per DAO No. 24, 1991.
- 3. Revised regulations re: industrial forest plantation development and issuance of IFMA, per DAO No. 42, s. 1991.
- 4. Regulations re: export of finished and semifinished wood products and imposing a 1% verification and inspection fees based on FOB value of wood export, per DAO No. 54, s. 1991.
- 5. Iterim rates of forest charges pursuant to R.A. No. 7161, per DAO No. 56, s. 1991.
- 6. No hauling of logs from virgin forest effective Jan 01, 1992, per Memo Order No. 09, s. 1991.
- 7. No logging unless permanent land-use plan for concession area indicated in the IAOP, per DENR Memo Circular No. 15, s. 1991.

Because of the climate dictating the time of planting, a TLA holder should be allowed to cover up for the deficiency the following year instead of immediately.

The amount and/or premium is excessive; collateral difficult to satisfy; and the rules are replete with safeguards and/or penalties.

PWPA requested for a gradual phase-out of logging from virgin to residual forests.

PWPA submitted to the DENR a number of amendments to the regulations; e.g. automatic coversion of former ITPLA into IFMA; do away with performance bond; period of development at discretion of IFMA holder and not within 5 years; comprehensive plan attuned to first rotation and not for a 25 years horizon; and access to second growth not tied with entire development of IFP.

Regulations are not only contrary to the national policy of expediting export but like-wise contrary to normal procedures of export and the fees are excessive and will make export uncompetitive.

DENR imposed a fixed rate of P550 for common and construction hardwoods. PWPA submitted that in the implementation of R.A. 7161 regional prices, instead of national average, be considered as basis of ad valorem tax.

PWPA requested for extension period, since DAO No. 24, s. 1991 prescribed the ending of logging in virgin forest by Jan 01, 1992 it is not possible to haul down logs immediately by Jan 01, 1992 also.

PWPA submitted that an aerial photo coverage, a project yet to be undertaken under DAO No. 88, s. 1991, will be necessary to comply with this requirement.

The DENR accepted the PWPA proposal.

The DENR tabled this condition for future stud-

The DENR disapproved the request and insisted on the shift by 01 January 1992.

The DENR accepted PWPA rationale and amendments being worked out with NRMP, ADB and DENR

The DENR issued DAO No. 01, s. 1992 suspending the implementation of DAO No. 54, s. 1991 as it reverted to the old procedures of ex-

The DENR convened the Log Price Committee per DENR Memo Circular No. 16, s. 1991. The guidelines for average FOB market prices for Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao now contained in DENR Adm. Order No. 65, s. 1991.

The DENR, through momeranda to REDs, allowed the hauling beyond Jan 01, 1992 provided logs are in decks or ponds.

The DENR temporarily suspended this requirement for the preparation of CY 1992 IAOP until the aerial photo project is completed.

#### 8. Imposition of various fees.

- 8.1 DENR REDs imposing license fee, per complaints of some PWPA TLAholder.
- 8.2 DENR REDs imposing silvicultural fee for damaged residuals, per complaints of some PWPA TLA -holder members.
- 8.3 Inspection fee on wood export.
- 9. Logging operations to be in limbo in CY 1992 as results of the inventory of residual forest, analysis of data, etc, are very late.
- B. Arising from Congress
- 1. In main spirits, HB No. 21223 and SB1404, as passed by the respective chamber of Congress, seem very different. The former is toward selective logging ban; the latter, toward total commercial logging ban.
- 2. HB No. 22401 was passed by the House imposing a 20% ad valorem tax on the FOB, market price of logs. The Senate amended the bill imposing a high 40% ad valorem tax.

PWPA submitted the position that such license fee is a part of the forest tax under R.A. 7161.

Same position as above; besides, based on 4 times the forest tax, the fee is exhorbitant and more than the TSI cost per hectare for which the fee is intended.

Please see item 4, above.

Realizing the slow progress of field inventory, PWPA by the last quarter of 1991 requested DENR for temporary allowable cut for TLA holders.

PWPA, perforce, supported HB No. 21223 and fought against SB 1404. Senator Guingona's amendment seeking exemption for TLA holders with good track records in forest management and wood processing was defeated by Senator Mercado's amendment for no-exemption logging

Of the two percentage versions of the forest tax bill with the bicameral Conference Committee, PWPA submitted a position that the lower percentage is fair and equitable to producers, consumers and the government.

The DENR agreed with PWPA and accordingly instructed its REDS.

The DENR temporarily suspended implementation of this requirement until further studies.



The DENR assured PWPA that the shift from virgin to residual forest will be on schedule. Until end of 1991, no grant of acc.

These two bills are now with the Senate-House bicameral Conference Committee who will try to find a common ground to reconcile the conflict between selective and total logging ban provisions separately contained in the bills.

The bicameral Conference Committee approved a 25% ad valorem tax which eventually was signed into law. R. A. No. 7161 abolished the environmental and other fees imposed by the





#### **ORGANIZATION**

The Philippine Wood Products Association, Inc. (PWPA) (Association) is an association of corporations, partnerships and individuals engaged in logging, sawmilling, veneer and plywood manufacture, wood preservation, and other related activities. Incorporated as a nonstock, nonprofit corporation, the Association aims to achieve unity in the wood industry under a single integrated association that would serve as spokesman for the entire wood industry in its continuing dialogue with government authorities. Its services, programs and activities are all geared towards the promotion and development of the lumber and plywood industry.

The Association is exempt from payment of income tax with respect to revenue received in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 26 (f) of the National Internal Revenue Code.

#### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Membership and Assessment Dues

Membership dues of Timber License Agreement (TLA) holders, sawmillers and associate members are based on fixed monthly rates. Assessment dues of TLA holders are computed based on the area (in cubic meters) of logs actually produced.

#### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the assets ranging from 5 to 15 years. Ordinary repairs and expenditures which do not benefit future periods are expensed as incurred.

#### Foreign Currency Transactions

Foreign exchange gains or losses are credited or charged to current operations.

#### INTEREST INCOME

In accordance with the Memorandum of Agreement between the Association and the TLA holders, all interest accruing to the Reforestation Trust Fund Deposit shall become part of the general funds of the Association.

#### ASSOCIATION'S REGIONAL CHAPTERS

The Association maintains a number of regional chapters within the Philippines. These chapters (organized during the latter part of 1979 and during 1980) act as extensions of the Association in their respective regions. Dues collected by these chapters are turned over to the Association. Ten percent of such collections are remitted back to the chapters to cover their administrative expenses. For purposes of accounting, such amounts are treated as expenses upon receipt of the chapters' collections.
