TO OUR MEMBERS

THE WOOD-BASED INDUSTRIES IN REVIEW

For the wood-based industries, 1992 was a period of transition. From tremendous anxieties to a beginning of hope.

From a no clear direction of forest industry policies of the passing Aquino administration to the evolving, pragmatic policies rooted in sustainable development, of the new Ramos administration. From a sapping weakness to a renewed strength the wood-based industries had underwent.

From a near collapse of the wood-based industries - had SB1404 have prevailed over HB21223 during the dying days of the last Congress - to a rebirth of positive outlook. From an enveloping threat to a developing opportunity the wood-based industries had been challenged.

From the heavy onus heaped on the wood-based industries by past administrative fiats like TLA suspension and cancellation, logging moratorium, shifting of logging from virgin to residual forest and annual allowable cut reduction to the awesome adjustment in the operation.

The settling impact of this transition maybe reflected in the performance of the wood-based industries in 1992. The negative growth yet attained by the wood-based industries squeezing through this transition period was generally less alarming than the previous period as maybe appreciated from the preceding comparative performance highlights and from the following.

ROUNDWOOD OR LOG SUPPLY

A low log production in 1992, at 1.43 million cum, 26% below 1991 production, was attributed to the shifting of the logging operation from virgin to residual forest and the concomitant reduction in annual allowable cut.

The requirement for logs by the primary wood processors was met significantly by log importation and partially by the use of local plantation logs. The volume of log import in 1992, at 0.53 million cum, was 34% higher than the preceding year despite a more than 50% increase in their relative FOB prices.

PRODUCTION OF WOOD PRODUCTS

The downtrend in production of wood products such as lumber and plywood was mainly reflective of the low availability of log supply.

Lumber and plywood produced in 1992 was only 0.45 million cum and 0.27 million cum, a reduction from the 1991 levels by 38% and 20%, respectively.

Aggregate production of lumber, plywood and veneer was 30% less than the previous year, from 1.10 million cum in 1991 down to 0.76 million cum in 1992.

MARKETS

Out of the aggregate production in 1992 *supra*, only 21% or 0.16 million cum went to the export markets, with plywood, veneer and other wood-based panels accounting for 65% of the export. However, the total volume of export was about 50% less than the previous year; thus the revenue from the export of these products went down by 23%, from US\$69.48 million in 1991 to US\$53.55 million in 1992.

The combined export in 1992 of wood-based manufactured articles and furniture of wood in 1992 increased, valuewise, by only 1% from that of the preceding year (from US\$145.70 million up to US\$147.50 million). Notwithstanding an export value decrease by 3% of the wood-based manufactured articles and an increase by 22% of the furniture of wood, between them, the former still accounted for nearly 80% of the export revenue.

Significantly, however, the combined export receipts from these commodities in years 1991 and 1992 were higher by 52% and 64%, than the combined export receipts from lumber, plywood, veneer and other wood-based panels. Valuewise, in 1991 and 1992, the former constituted 68% and 73% of the total wood export receipts, that, including the latter, was placed at US\$215.18 million and US\$201.05 million, respectively.



MAJOR ISSUES FACED

The near passage in mid-1992 of the total commercial logging ban bill into law by the last Congress was the most excruciating issue ever faced by the wood-based industries; for it would have been the *coup de grace* to the sector, which was never prepared for a sudden post-logging scenario.

Hurdling it during the period was but a respite. On the convening of the new Congress, the Senate immediately refiled the bill banning commercial logging; however, the House of Representatives concentrated on the administration-certified bill, the Forestry Code of the Philippines, that embodies the policy of the Ramos government allowing logging on the basis of sustainable development.

The order of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources to shift logging from the virgin to the residual forest that took effect on 01 January 1992 created a serious crisis in forest management and in the operation of the wood-based industries. Forestry experts contended that the shift will break the sustainable growth and harvest cycle of the natural forest. On the other hand, the shift will dislocate the operation of all remaining TLA-holders, wood processors and wood-dependent downstream manufacturers because the shift, coupled with the logging moratorium

declared for Palawan Province, will mean a continuing scarcity of locally-sourced logs.

Elsewhere in this Report in a summary of the major issues that the wood-based industries tried to address during the period in review.

THE ASSOCIATION



B. Arising from Congress

- 1. Decision of the bicameral conference committee; whether HB 21223 with a feature of selective logging ban or SB 1404, a total logging ban, should be adopted.
- 2. At the Senate, the total commercial logging ban, exactly the same as SB 1404, was refiled by Senator Mercado immediately upon convening of the 9th Congress.
- 3. At the House of Representation, the Forestry Code of the Philippines was introduced following the State of the Nation Address of newly elected President

Before the recess, to give way for the national elections, and up to the adjournment or termination of the 8th Congress, PWPA lobbied for the enactment of the better HB 21223.


PWPA perforce remained consistent with its position. It lobbied, that the Senate instead considers the administration-certified bill, the Forestry Code of the Philippines.

Because of its features, among others, allowing logging under sustainable development, PWPA supported the Forestry Code of the Philippines. The "reconciled bill" on total ban "died" in the bicameral conference committee and therefore was not ratified by the 8th Congress.

Sen. Mercado's bill passed on first reading and submitted to the Committee on Natural Resources chaired by Sen. Tatad. No senator sponsored the Forestry Code of the Philippines.



NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Organization

The Philippine Wood Products Association, Inc. (Association) is an association of corporations, partnerships and individuals engaged in logging, sawmilling, veneer and plywood manufacture, wood preservation, and other related activities. Incorporated as a nonstock, nonprofit corporation, the Association aims to achieve unity in the wood industry under a single integrated association that would serve as spokesman for the entire wood industry in its continuing dialogue with government authorities. Its services, programs and activities are all geared towards the promotion and development of the lumber and plywood industry.

The Association is exempt from payment of income tax with respect to revenues received in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 26 (f) of the National Internal Revenue Code.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Membership and Assessment Dues

Membership dues of Timber License Agreement (TLA) holders, sawmillers and associate members are based on fixed monthly rates. Assessment dues of TLA holders are computed based on the area (in cubic meters) of logs actually produced.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the assets ranging from 5 to 15 years. Ordinary repairs and expenditures which do not benefit future periods are expensed as incurred.

Foreign Currency Transactions

Foreign exchange gains or losses are credited or charged to current operations.



4. Interest Income

In accordance with the Memorandum of Agreement between the Association and the TLA holders, all interest accruing to the Reforestation Trust Fund Deposit shall become part of the general funds of the Association.

5. Association's Regional Chapters

The Association maintains a number of regional chapters within the Philippines. These chapters (organized during the latter part of 1979 and during 1980) act as extensions of the Association in their respective regions. Dues collected by these chapters are turned over to the Association. Ten percent of such collections are remitted back to the chapters to cover their administrative expenses. For purposes of accounting, such amounts are treated as expenses upon receipt of the chapters' collections.


SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT CONCEPT AND GOALS

SUSTAINABLE MANAGEMENT OF TROPICAL FORESTS

Sustainable forest management is the process of managing permanent forest land to achieve one or more clearly specified objectives of management with regard to the production of a continuous flow of desired forest products and services without undue reduction of its inherent values and future productivity and without undue undesirable effects on the physical and social environment. (ITTO - Policy Development Series No. 3. 1992).
