




WOOD-BASED INDUSTRY IN REVIEW


After nearly a decade, since 1986, of economic policy liberalization, it is only the forestry sector, the primary wood-based industry in particular, that has not made a modicum of recovery from its prolonged slump.


The sad state of the industry is reflected from its falling local production and, by extension, its diminishing export contribution, on one hand; and, on the other, its increasing import of timber and timber products.











The continuing absence of a good policy climate for the forestry sector, supposedly to be provided by Congress and the Executive (DENR), has created a ritual situation that has been exacerbating for the industry.

The 1995 performance of the industry is no different from the previous years'; dismall still.

ROUNDWOOD OR LOG SUPPLY

The log supply for domestic wood processing totalled 1.31 million cum - only 4% lower than the previous year. However, a significant 53% of the volume came from importation, compared with only 30% in the previous year.

The short supply of locally-sourced logs might be attributed not only to an 11% reduction in AAC (from 0.94 million to 0.84 million cum) but in the inability of the industry to harvest 27% of the 1995 AAC.

Providentially, the low supply of locallysourced logs occurred at a time of global availability of logs despite their high prices and far sources or origins.

TO OUR MEMBERS

PRODUCTION AND IMPORTATION OF WOOD PRODUCTS

The domestic production of finished primary wood products was down by 20% (from 0.70 million to 0.56 million cum). Lumber production suffered the most, down by 34% (from 0.41 million to 0.27 million cum). Plywood and veneer production declined by 6% only (from 0.30 million to 0.28 million cum).

The importation of logs that increased by 75% from the previous year (from 0.40 million to 0.70 million cum) helped the local processing mills busy, as it were. Lumber importation that increased by 27% (from 0.30 million to 0.38 million cum) not only cushioned the supply shortfall in the domestic market but it supported the modest increase in export. The importation of plywood remained insignificant.

WOOD MARKETS AND TRADE BALANCE

Locally-produced and imported finished primary wood products in aggregate, was only 6% less than the 1994 level (from 1.00 million to 0.94 million cum).

The domestic market consumed about 86% of the supply of these products as against 92% in 1994. Domestic consumption fell by 14% in 1995 (from 0.93 million to 0.80 million cum).

The aggregate export volume of 0.13 million cum with a total value of US\$33.84 million were suprisingly 73% and 51% higher than the comparative figures in 1994.

The trade balance in wood products posted a positive US\$9.92 million only, but 67% below the preceding year at US\$31.36 million.

MAJOR ISSUES FACED

The major issues faced by the wood-based industry during the period in review were a case of *deja vu* - see following pages of this Report under Major Industry Issues - and summarized below:

- The gridlock in Congress both Houses are considering different bills as the national policy for forestry: sustainable forest management act by the Lower House and total logging ban act by the Upper House;
- The tight supply and increasing prices of locally-sourced and imported logs coupled with the uncontrolled entry of misdeclared wood products like plywood; and
- The issuance of constraining DENR rules and regulations that make industry operations more difficult.

THE ASSOCIATION

At the forefront protecting the interests of the wood-based industry is your Association. Its attention has continued to focus on addressing key issues and problems facing the industry.

At the beginning of 1995, key officers of PWPA had assumed offices they had been voted into by the Directors of the Board. Directors A. C. Olizon and A. G. Bernas are the new Chairman of the Board and the new President of the Association, respectively. Director and Chairman of Advisory Council E. F. Sanvictores was elected Chairman of Asean Panel Products Federation (APPF) to serve the 1996-1998 term.

At this point, we, together with the Directors of the Board and other officers of PWPA, would like to extend our special thanks to our members who have been extra supportive of the programs of our Association. They have shown their concern not only for their own respective company but to the entire industry itself.

ISSUES

POSITION TAKEN BY PWPA

STATUS

A. ARISING FROM DENR

- 1. DMO No. 95-03 dated January 27, 1995 (supplementary guidelines to DMO No. 94-26 dated December 27. 1994 re: moratorium on milling operations in Agusan Provinces) would allow a TLA-/WPP-holder to operate only after every wood processing plants have been evaluated their of performance or inventoried of their log, lumber and other wood products stock.
- DMO No. 95-07 dated March 27, 1995 (in relation with DAO No. 93-68 amending of DAO No. 93-60) conditionally lifted the suspension on the cutting of natural forest stands inside IFMA areas.
- DMO No. 95-10 dated May 26, 1995 (in relation with DAO No. 94-31 amending Sec. 17.8 of DAO No. 94-07) clarified and redefined the coverage of Greater Manila Area.
- DAO No. 95-17 dated May 20, 1995, institutionalizing the operations of the Multisectoral Forest Protection Committees (MFPCs) within the DENR system and on account thereof, MFPCs assumed their role as watchdogs of TLA-holders' logging operations.

PWPA submitted the position that wood processing plants of TLA-holders who are WPP holders should be exempted from the moratorium on milling operations; or, at the least, to allow them to resume immediate operations soon after their performance has been through being assessed. PWPA also recommended the phase-out of mini-sawmills as they have been the cause of logging anomalies in the said provinces.

DMO No. 95-07 was issued by the DENR in response to the recommendation of PWPA that cutting of natural forest stands inside IFMA areas is a valid exercise of operations allowed in the approved comprehensive plan and importantly in the IFMA, a contract neither one party may simply unilaterally modify without the consent of the other.

DMO 95-10 was issued by the DENR in response to the recommendation of PWPA to include the entire Province of Bulacan as a part of CLO-free zone re: lumber transport.

In several meetings of MFPCs, e.g. Aurora Province, Cagayan de Oro, Marawi, etc. PWPA has explained that TLA-holders, more than any stakeholders, are most concerned about forest protection for their own benefit and that cooperation rather than conflict should govern MFPCs and TLA-holders relations.

In the implementation of the primary and supplementary orders, the DENR considered favorably the recommendations of PWPA; i.e. the case to case or company to company lifting of milling suspension and the exempting of long-established and operating mills of TLA/WPP-holders from relocating away from the Agusan River. The operations of mini-sawmills have been somewhat rationalized.

DMO No. 95-07 was enforced until October 25, 1995 when, through a memo to all REDs, the new Secretary of DENR - in suspending the acceptance and processing of IFMA applications earlier allowed under DMO No. 95-15 dated July 13, 1995 - likewise suspended implementation of DAO No. 93-60 and the operations of existing IFMAs.

The transport of lumber without CLOs up to Zambales and Pampanga through Bulacan is now possible.

Through the MFPC fora, where it has been invariably invited into, PWPA was able to erase certain misconceptions about logging as it was able to recommend measures to make effective the functions of MFPCs. In some provinces or regions, the relationship between MFPCs and TLA-holders is good.

ISSUES

POSITION TAKEN BY PWPA

STATUS

5. As the last three months of Toward the end of 1995, with the 1995 - the period for the preparation, submission, and approval IAOPs of approached, **TLA-holders** were in a quandary as to the new requirements DENR may impose for the approval of 1996 IAOPs.

submission of aerial photos as seemingly the main requirements for the approval of IAOPs, PWPA apprised the DENR on the status of the aerial photo project under DAO No. 92-17 which, in the main, was still incomplete.

Guidelines for The processing and approval of 1996 **IAOPs** have vet to promulgated by the DENR. And because of the delay in the completion of aerial project, approval of the 1996 IAOPs may not come on time.

B. ARISING FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

- 1. Executive Order No. 263 dated July 19, 1995. mandating that Community Based Forest Management (CBFM) shall be the national for sustainable strategy development and forest social justice.
- 2. Executive Order No. 264 1995. dated July 22, modifying (reducing) tariffs of various imported products, including wood products, in accordance with the listed schedules of implementation.

It is the view of PWPA that in principle, CBFM is one way of protecting forests not anymore under the TLA-system. CBFM is also the policy thrust of H.B. No. 2966. Under CBFM. community and private sector may work out a good partnership.

With the tariff reduction to be fully implemented by January 01, 2003. PWPA. through its Plywood Council, requested membership in PCCI-Customs Consultative Group to protect the interest of the industry.

PWPA will comment on the possible role of the private sector in CBFM as soon as the draft regulations rules and implementing E.O. No. 203 were issued by DENR. Workshops on CBFM are being scheduled for 1996 by DENR.

Executive Order No. 264 is currently being implemented following the listed schedules of tariff reduction, including that pertaining to imported logs and wood products.

C. ARISING FROM 10TH CONGRESS

- 1. The Upper House (Senate) refiled the total logging ban bills: S.B. No. 272 by Sen. Mercado and S.B. No. 702 by Sen. Alvarez.
- 2. The Lower House filed a new bill, H.B. No. 2966, the Sustainable Forest Management Act of 1995, principally authored by Lower House Natural Committee on Resources Chair, Cong. Fua, and Cong. Paras.

During the Senate hearing, the position of PWPA - that total logging ban is not the answer to the multi-faceted problems of forestry - has made the Chair of Resources Natural the Committee to remand the bill for re-study by its Secretariat.

Close examination of the bill would reveal that it is very similar to the 9th Congress' H.B. No. 10042 (Forestry Reform During the hearing, Code). PWPA supported the main features of the bill, including allowing TLAs to remain valid up to their natural expiry dates.

In the light of the position of the Chair of the Committee on Natural Resources, it seems unclear how a reconciled bill would ever get out of the Committee with members having different positions on the issue.

As its consideration will involve changes in some laws and its implementation - when passed into law - will require funds, the bill was referred to the Committees on Appropriations and Ways and Means where it is currently pending.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Organization

The Philippine Wood Producers Association, Inc. (Association) is an association of corporations, partnerships and individuals engaged in logging, sawmilling, veneer and plywood manufacture, wood preservation, and other related activities. Incorporated as a nonstock, nonprofit corporation, the Association aims to achieve unity in the wood industry under a single integrated association that would serve as spokesman for the entire wood industry in its continuing dialogue with government authorities. Its services, programs and activities are all geared towards the promotion and development of the lumber and plywood industry.

The Association is exempt from payment of income tax with respect to revenues received in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 26 (f) of the National Internal Revenue Code.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Cash Equivalents

The Association considers all highly liquid investments purchased with maturities of three months or less from date of acquisition to be cash equivalents.

Membership and Assessment Dues

Membership dues of Timber License Agreement (TLA) holders, sawmillers and associate members are based on fixed monthly rates. Assessment dues of TLA holders are computed based on the annual allowable cuts.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Ordinary repairs and expenditures which do not benefit future periods are expensed as incurred.

5. Association's Regional Chapters

The Association maintains a number of regional chapters within the Philippines. These chapters (organized during the latter part of 1979 and during 1980) act as extensions of the Association in their respective regions. Dues collected by these chapters are turned over to the Association. Ten percent of such collections are remitted back to the chapters to cover their administrative expenses. For purposes of accounting, such amounts are treated as expenses upon receipt of the chapters' collections.

6. Change in Corporate Name

On February 11, 1994, the Securities and Exchange Commission approved the change in the Association's name from Philippine Wood Products Association, Inc. to Philippine Wood Producers Association, Inc.
